Five alums honored as MHS Hall of Distinction inductees

A crowd of friends, family members, and community members gathered on Marion High School's Homecoming Weekend to celebrate the 2017 class of inductees to the MHS Hall of Distinction, GIANTS in the fields of business, dentistry, and education.

The MHS Hall of Distinction induction banquet is a highlight of the year and is always an inspirational event. This year was no exception.

The Hall of Distinction banquet is part reunion, part celebration, part inspiration. Attendees walk away remembering all the fantastic things about their time at Marion High School, and looking toward a bright future.

The five 2017 inductees were:

- Art Faulkner, Marion High School Class of 1958, a well-known, highly respected philanthropist and humanitarian in the Marion community, who retired as a department director at Marion General Hospital and who served for years on the Marion Community Schools Board of School Trustees.



MHS is state leader in college, career readiness

Marion High School is a state leader in college and career readiness, according to the Indiana Department of Education.

MHS's CCR rate for 2015 (the latest year for which certified data is available) is 89.29 percent, reflecting the percentage of our students who earned early college credit, passed an AP exam, or earned a workplace certification. This is one of the highest rates in the state, surpassing many well-known and well-respected schools.

The purpose of PK-12 education is to prepare students for success in life beyond high school. This rate reflects in a very real way a student's potential for such success. "Preparing our students to be productive citizens after they leave us, ready to attend college or enter the workforce, is a main component of the mission of Marion High School," MHS Principal Keith Burke said. "The CCR rate is one of the most important numbers to us, because it is an indicator that we are preparing our students for success not just in the halls of Marion High School, but in their life beyond high school."

The graduating classes since 2015 at MHS have increasingly exceled, establishing new highs in the data points the CCR tracks (though those numbers are not yet certified and released by the IDOE). The CCR is one of the requirements included in accountability grades issued by the IDOE.

"There is something for every student in Marion Community Schools," MCS Superintendent Brad Lindsay said. "We provide real-world and life-ready training so every student can become the best they were created to be for the world."

Marion Community Schools expressed pride in their students, and their teachers and staff who work hard to provide these opportunities through Marion High School and Marion Regional Career Center. They also expressed gratitude for partnerships locally with Ivy Tech Community College, Indiana Wesleyan University, and Taylor University, as well as partnerships statewide with colleges including Indiana University and Vincennes University, along with various industry certification organizations and area businesses who offer internship opportunities.

MHS JROTC continues to rank among best in the U.S.

The Marion High School JROTC Raiders competed this past weekend against the country's best Army JROTC teams at the Raider National Championship, and both MHS teams finished in the top 10.

MHS fielded both an all-male and an all-female team, which finished 10th and 7th in their respective categories. In addition, two Marion cadets earned accolades for their placements during the Best Raider Competition: seniors Thomas Schenck and Adriana Aleman placed 15th and 25th in the nation, respectively.

During the Best Raider Competition, the cadets run nearly two miles while wearing a 35-pound backpack and negotiating various obstacles, including a 10-foot wall they must scale.

"These young people are amazing," said Lt. Col. (Retired) David Farlow, the senior Army instructor and coach for the Raider Team. "These results are the culmination of months of hard work and dedication. Our cadets faced off against the best teams from across the country, including many private military

mud pit.

- One-rope bridge crossing nearly 90 feet over a river
- Physical team test, where cadets run and carry a variety of items while negotiating an 800-meter course with various obstacles
- The Gauntlet, where the cadets wear 35-pound backpacks and run nearly 1 mile through a wooded terrain while negotiating various

really meld together, relying on each other while learning how to overcome the exhaustion associated with Raider competitions. These Raiders are awesome."

The 7th-place finish is the highest finish ever for a JROTC team from Marion High School at a national competition.

Cadet Gavin Collins, a sophomore who competed for the first time at Raider Nationals, weighed in on the experience: "It made me feel good to see that all of the hard work we put in paid off. The competition was very hard, but the trip was a lot of fun."

Many individuals and organizations donated to help the MHS Raider team travel to the championship.

"We simply could not provide the cadets with such an opportunity without the tremendous support from our community and school system," Farlow said.

Last spring, the MHS JROTC received the highest rating possible from the U.S. Army — Honor Unit with Distinction — following its formal inspection of the program. Only 10 percent of JROTC units in the country receive this rating.

The MHS JROTC program is open to anyone of high school age in Grant County. Anyone interested in becoming a cadet in the JROTC program will need to work with the guidance department at MHS and at their home high school to arrange their schedule appropriately.
